#### A warm welcome to São Luis

We finally arrived in São Luis in the second week in August and left behind the many friends we had made in Campinas. We were greeted at the airport by the "Off the Streets" team as well as a number of other missionaries we had met before.

We have begun to work with the team at the drop-in centres three times a week, Sunday School and a few other things. One of the dropin centres is near a big roundabout, the lads wash the windscreens of the cars when the lights turn red. It's a hot and dirty job and they often sustain injuries, such as burns on their legs from the exhausts of passing motorcycles. One of the lads had a very nasty gash on his leg the other day but was able to receive help from one of

the team. It is through showing compassion in even the simple things that we are able to start to change lives.

The other day at one of the drop in centres, a 10 year old boy came in. He had stowed away onboard a goods train and had traveled for 2 days to get to São Luis. The look on his face was one of bewilderment as the realization of what he had done finally began to sink in. Here he was, 2 days journey from home in an unfamiliar city where everyone was a stranger. He sat down and talked to one of the centre team as he said he wished to return home. We wait to see what will happen. In some ways he is one of the fortunate ones who makes it, others fall from the trains and don't make it.

### A Growing Church

The church in Jota Lima, just outside São Luis, that was started just a few months ago continues to grow. Week by week new people come along and it is encouraging to see so many children among them. If numbers continue to increase we will have to buy some more chairs - a great problem to have!

church as it was the first ever baptismal service. Nine believers were baptized in an old water tank in the shade of a mango tree. We look forward to next time and pray it will be soon.

### Settling Down

When we arrived in São Luis we stayed at the mission's guest house and had no idea how long it would take us to find a house. It was a great answer to prayer to find a house on our second day here and to move in a week later.

Although we enjoyed living in Campinas we were on the eighth floor of an apartment block but now we are in a house the children can go across to the playground easily and safely without having to use the lift or climb 8 flights of stairs.

The house had been empty for a few months so we had to evict the wildlife before we moved in. not many spiders but plenty of little liz-

The children here are from a mixture of backgrounds and accept one another without any trait of hostility. One of the main differences in São Luis is that most people here haven't had much contact with foreigners and so find it enormously difficult to understand us. Letting go and letting God work can be most frustrating and yet is at the very heart of everything that we do in our work here.
